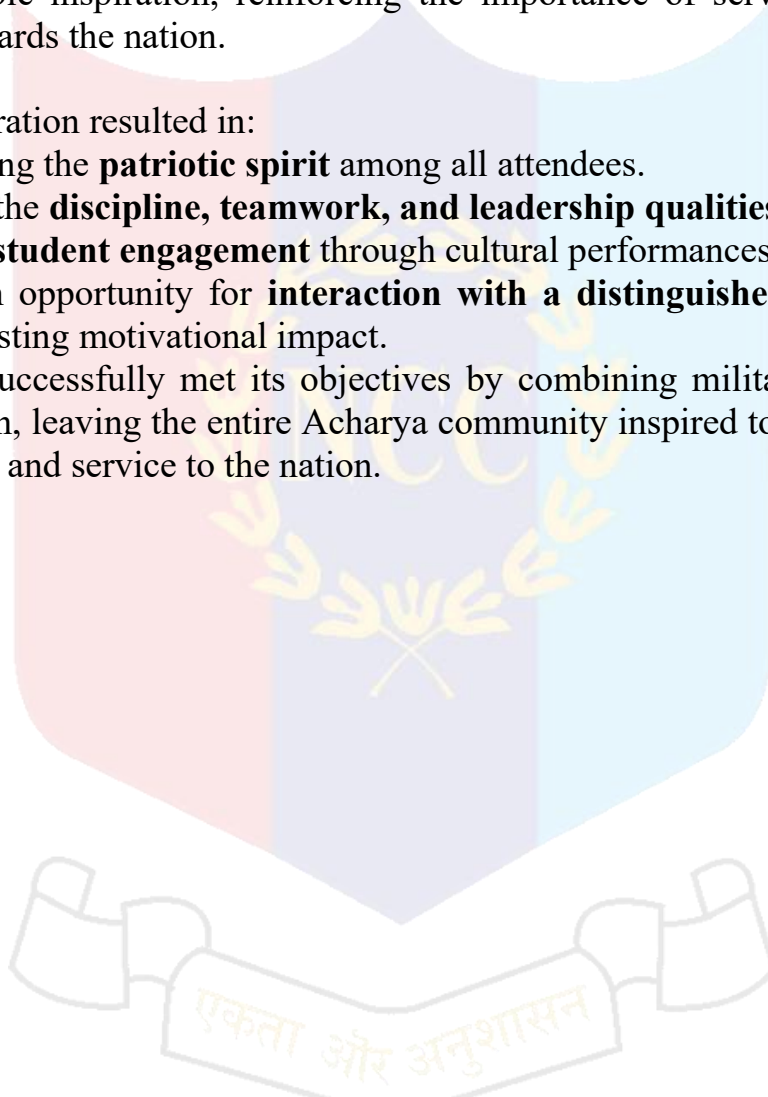

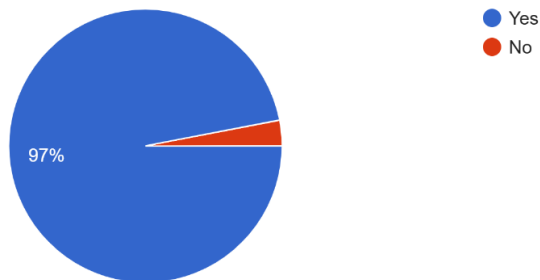

Were the objectives and outcomes of the program clearly communicated to you?

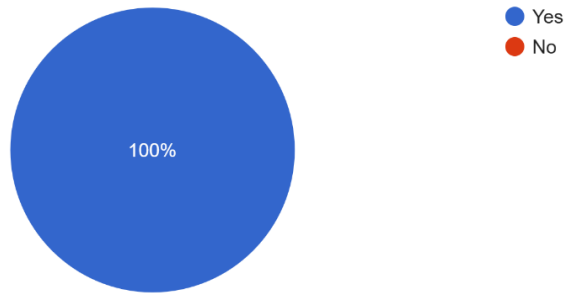
33 responses



97% of participants clearly understood the outcomes of the program.

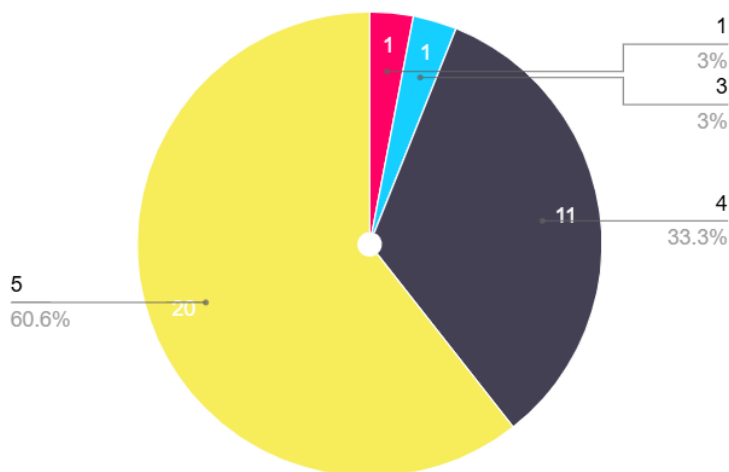
Did the program meet the objectives of organizing the event?
